



## Activity Information Voices in Pictures

Name of Activity	SHOW AND TELL
Language(s)	Any
Suggested Level	Elementary/Pre-intermediate
Suggested Objectives	<ul> <li>Students:</li> <li>practice describing objects and defining their functions</li> <li>recycle/expand their vocabulary of everyday objects</li> </ul>
Procedure	<ol> <li>Students are asked to take pictures of details of about 10 different everyday objects with their mobile phones/cameras) to class. He/she shows them a 'close up' picture of an edge of a whiteboard and describes the object: <i>It is flat.</i> You write and draw on <i>it.</i> You can find it in every classroom. Students guess what he/she is describing.</li> <li>Teacher puts students into pairs. In pairs students take turns in describing everyday objects of their choice to one another (also showing pictures of the objects that students themselves took prior to the lesson) and guessing what these objects of their choice to view or the elsson) and guessing what these objects of their choice to we or an any 'describing' phrases (see examples above).
